### **Reception Trip to the Curve**

This week has been more exciting than a box of frogs in Reception, because the children have attended their first trip of the year. On Thursday, in the middle of the pouring rain, the children stepped onto the bus, full of joy, excitement and wonder. Soon after, they arrived at the Curve to see a presentation of The Owl Who Came for Christmas. For at least some of our children, this was the very first time they had ever been to the Curve, and to say that they all had an excellent time would be an understatement. There are few things better than live theatre, and in Leicester, we are very lucky to have so many options. The quality of the production is always of the highest order, and I know just how much the children enjoyed themselves. ### **Our New Buildings**

On Thursday afternoon this week, I met once again with the Department for Education to receive a progress update in respect of our new buildings. I am happy to report that again, there has been good progress, and I am beginning to feel more and more confident that we will be able to move in from Wednesday 28th February 2024. School will close at 3.15 pm on Thursday 15th **February** for the half-term holidays, allowing time for the move to take place during the February half-term. On Tuesday 27th February 2024, there will be an open afternoon, and also an opening ceremony. I did hear talk of a red-ribbon being cut, which is very exciting indeed. I guess the only question that remains is who is going to cut it? Please be assured, we are working on this, and want the day to be very memorable indeed.

### **Collection from the TMS Building**

Just a quick plea for your help with the buses from Judgemeadow each day. Of late, some parents have been changing the arrangements, as to whether or not their child is on the bus or being collected. This can cause some confusion, and also delays with the buses. Going forward, it would be very helpful indeed if you could phone through any changes before 3.05 pm. If you call after this time, it will not be possible to make any changes, and we will honour the previous arrangement that was in place. Finally, please can I remind those parents that collect from Judgemeadow, the window is between **3.15-3.25 pm**. Please can you ensure you arrive between these 2-times? #### Wellies and Worms in Year 2

I just wanted to devote an additional page in the newsletter this week to the children in Year 2 who have been working incredibly hard up at the allotment. This provision has come to an end, for now, so what better way to celebrate than looking back on what they have all achieved. Before I do this, I would like to thank Mrs. Barnes for the amazing work she has undertaken. The quality of learning has been truly outstanding, and the very fact this took place outside confirms that it will be retained by the children. Learning outdoors is always better than learning at a desk!

What made this provision so special was that this group of children attended the allotment when they were in Year 1. All of the planting and sowing has now come full-circle, and the children have been able to harvest the potatoes, beans, radishes, carrots, tomatoes and cucumbers they'd planted before. The children confirmed they were delicious, and special thanks to Mrs. Patel for making some of those potatoes into Bombay sandwiches! Of course the children have found out that they can grow produce of their own and that it tastes even better than what you can buy from the supermarket.

Other activities that the children have enjoyed include leaf rubbing, closely observing the plants and the leaves, mud painting, playing with conkers, den-building, pumpkin scooping (and eating the seeds), natural dyes on cloth, and wrapping sticks with wool. The majority of these activities take place within continuous provision, which means that as soon as they arrive at the allotment, they are getting busy! They can also choose which spaces they operate in, and when these two criteria are combined, they create the very best conditions for optimal learning. Within this context, the children have been weeding, digging, playing in the sand, digging for treasure, den building, weaving, and watering all of the plants.

Another important part of the provision is for the children to be able to recognise plants in the wild. They build on this in Year 5, with the Forest School, but our Year 2 children have become very good at naming trees, including those that are in the school grounds. Connected to this is seed dispersal, especially the maple and sycamore. Nature truly is ingenious!!

To help us improve provision still further (not sure if this is possible), we have sent out some evaluation forms and it would be great if parents could spend a few moments completing these. If you have sent them back into school, my very sincere thanks for doing this. As part of the evaluation, we will also be creating a floor-book that will be placed into the man reception area at the Mayflower site. As you look through, try to focus on the children's faces. You will see deep engagement, high levels of involvement, joy, wonder, and achievement. This is what successful learning is all about.

On the next page of this newsletter, we have gathered together some photographs, but please keep in mind that this is only a very small sample. Once all of our evaluations have been completed, we hope that you will be able to find time to celebrate this learning, and for those parents in Nursery, Reception, and Year 1, this is something you can really look forward to.
